Titans bring home 8th



Team celebrates a remarkable season

The Leola-Frederick Titans brought home the eighth-place plaque from the State B boys basketball tournament March 14-16, where they drew large crowds, enthusiastic fan support, and accolades even from fans from other schools.

The Titans played Castlewood

in the Thursday evening game, when the southeast bleachers were filled with supporters. Despite a leading at times in the fourth quarter, Titans lost 67-72 as Castlewood's 6-foot-7 Bryon Laue made good on his height advantage.

The Titans faced Gregory on Friday night and came up just short, losing 64-65 on a late Gregory free throw.

In the final contest, the Titans

took on Viborg-Hurley, which found a way through the Titans' fierce press often enough to hand them a 75-84 loss.

A homecoming welcome the next day found a lot to celebrate nevertheless. Jeff Mueller, who announces Leola home games, spoke about the difference the team had made. See an edited version of his remarks as well as photos from each of the games, on pages 6-9.

Opt-out passes with 56 percent in favor

Voters chose to approve a \$450,000 opt-out to support the Frederick Area School District's general fund with 85 voting in favor and 67 opposed in the April 9 election.

At the Frederick precinct, the vote was 60-40 in favor; at the

Westport precinct, it was 27-25 opposed.

Of the 709 registered voters in the Frederick Area School District when registration closed, 152 voted in the election, which was a voter turnout of 21.4 percent.

The opt-out will help the school

district keep teachers' compensation packages competitive, as well as help the district deal with a change in the capital outlay funding formula that would have limited the amount available to pay for textbooks and other real property, equipment, and software.

First National is one of few remaining family-owned banks

First National Bank of Frederick has a long and interesting history in our community.

It was first established in 1882 by the Dow Bros. as a private bank and located across the street from the current bank. The business was then purchased in 1886 by J.C. Simmons and S.P. Howell, and it became a State Bank of Frederick. In 1894, it was lost to a fire. In 1906 the current bank building was built and changed the bank status from a State Bank to a National Bank of Frederick and sold to F.C Benjamin.

In December of 1915, A.W. Campbell, an attorney and judge, and his son, J.C. Campbell, purchased it. It was then owned by Robert K. Campbell and current owners are Robert W. Campbell and R. Scott Campbell, making it a five-generation-owned bank.

The bank offers services of general banking, loans, and safety deposit boxes. In 2014, it be-

gan online banking and updated the online banking platform and website in 2023. They also have an insurance department located in the bank doing business as J.C Campbell Ins.

The bank is one of a few single-office, family-owned, independent banks in the area that remained open during the Depression and continues to serve the surrounding area. They are proud supporters of the Frederick area communities.

The bank currently has four employees.

Part of the interest that the account generates is returned to the community as grants. The amount available for grant-giving has increased each year; in 2023, the foundation awarded \$8,000, and \$6,400 was awarded in 2022.

Grant applications are accepted in January every year. The board would welcome grant

applications from the Barnard, Westport, and Elm Lake areas, as well as continue to receive applications from nonprofits in Frederick.

One NBCF project in the works is the creation of memorial cards. The cards, which are free, can be given to a family to indicate a donation is being given to NBCF in memory of a loved one who died. Watch for those cards to be available in the Community Store soon.

Congratulations to the eighth-place finishers at the South Dakota State Class B Boys Basketball Tournament, the Leola/Frederick Titans!

While the tournament didn't go the way everyone wanted, we all know this was a sea-

son to remember and a season for the record books. Some of those highlights:

- They set a team record with 22 wins, breaking the previous record of 20 set by the 2004-05 team.
- This team set the record for the most wins to start a season with 12. The previous record for best start was 7 wins, by that same 04-05 squad.
- Those 12 wins also make up the longest winning streak of any kind in Titan history, which you could have guessed. But they also had a 10-game winning streak, after the Faulkton loss, and that was tied for the 2nd longest, along with, again, the 04-05 team. The 03-04 team won 9 in a row, and the 2019-20 team won 8. Of the top five winning streaks, this team had two of them.
- The team had a few firsts the first So-Dak 16 appearance and the first SoDak 16 win for the boys' program.
- This was our first State B tourney appearance in 19 years.
- Brayden Sumption was awarded the Mark Seftner scholarship and was selected to the All-Tournament team. Congratulations to him on those individual honors.
- This season the team had its first win over Warner since 2020, its first win over Ellendale since 2020, and its first win over Aberdeen Christian since 2017.

The Titans showed they belonged on the big stage. The respect that they wanted all season was earned this weekend, and they proved they could play with those teams from down south. I wonder how many people across the state were watching and had to look online to figure out where Leola and Frederick were on a map of South Dakota. They know who we

are and where we are now!

It was pretty awesome to see all the features written about our team at the end of the season. It felt like there was a new one nearly every day for about a week, including Coach Pashen's several interviews on the radio.

We should all be proud of how this team handled themselves on the court. There was no chirping at the officials, no complaining, no dirty looks after a call went against us. I heard people say this at least four times over the weekend. You left it all on the court, playing hard the whole weekend. Congratulations on showing good sportsmanship and representing your team, your co-op, that Titan logo, your schools, and your towns and communities with the highest level of class.

While there is some disappointment in not finishing higher, some of you heard former player and coach Luke Bruns talked about the memories that were made that are almost more important. Memories that no one can take away from you. And I'm guessing you guys have plenty of stories that you'll talk about every time you see each other in the years to come. - An eighth-place plaque, and a SoDak 16 plaque, will be up in each school.
- This year's yearbooks will have your pictures and names and accomplishments for future kids to see, and for people to look back on as the years pass. And, you have just provided more reasons for elementary and junior high kids, our future Titans, to work hard to try to match or even surpass your accomplishments.

Whoever you looked up to when you were in junior high or elementary, YOU are now the person these other little kids are looking to emulate and copy. There are probably some kids out there that are going to drive their coaches nuts shooting 3-pointers from the N in Titans the next few years.

• In the tournament program, each participating team is listed from 1916 to the present. This team will now be in that group. By the way, this is now the combined 11th appearance in the boys' state tourney between the two schools.

To get to the tournament, it takes preparation, dedication, and hard work, both in the offseason and during the season. There is also some luck involved, but you have to be in position to take advantage of that luck, and when the opportunity presents itself, you have to take hold of it. Be proud that you were able to do that – remember, there are 65 other class B teams that would trade places with us, and many good teams both this year and in other years, including some pretty good Titans teams, that fell short of the state tournament.


