

Podoll helps to deliver a baby through 911 call

If 2020 showed us anything, it is that many things can be accomplished virtually or remotely. 2020 Frederick Area grad Haydn Podoll can check off delivering a baby over the phone to his life experience list.

Podoll, who has been working at Brown County dispatch since June, answered the call of a woman in labor late Friday night, Feb. 13.

"Typically, we have two workers on call, rotating between calls and police radio traffic," Podoll said. "It was just my day to be on the phones."

The call, which lasted a span of 20 minutes going past midnight to Saturday morning, included sending an ambulance crew located by the airport to a location west of U.S. Highway 281. An ambulance crew that would have been closer was already on another call.

"It definitely ranks up there

as one of my most intense calls, as the lady didn't have any pain meds," Podoll said. "I just remembered my training and listened to their replies and tried to ask the most appropriate questions for the situation. I just tried to stay calm and help the dad physically deliver the baby."

Podoll is hoping to use this dispatch position as a stepping stone to a law enforcement career.

Haydn was presented the Stork Award by the Brown County Sheriff's Office and Communication Center.



Rich Bakeberg provided a utility report. Tami Nickelson brought up the possibility of the city having virtual meetings, but the board had concerns about liability. Nickelson also discussed projects going on in the town including some community classes, steps being taken to provide recycling, and looking into adding crosswalks in town. There will be a community meeting on April 1 to talk about other upcoming community projects.

NEW BUSINESS

One petition for the open board seat was turned in by Troy Millard, so there will be no board election. The Wayside Cemetery fund generated \$4,744.64 this year which they will spend by designating the funds to the library. The Wayside Cemetery Fund was created through a generous donation. The town acts as a conduit for the investment earnings to go through to Alpha Circle who then decides where the money will be spent. The Frederick Equalization Board meets at 7PM on Monday, Mar. 15 and Friday Mar. 19, 2021. The board read and accepted the first reading of the annual report with a motion by Kosters/Millard; motion carried. The second reading will be at the next regular meeting. The city's insurance policy will be renewed on April 1, the cost increased by about \$600 from the prior year. Motion to approve the insurance policy for the coming year made by Millard/Kosters; motion carried. A citizen had sewer issues, and Bakeberg brought the bill to ask about the city's possible responsibility, but it was determined it was at the expense of the citizen as it was closer to the residence than the tie in.
