School opt-out passes with 2-1 margin

Voters passed a measure to increase the amount that the Frederick Area School District can raise for its general fund by exactly a 2-1 margin on September 7.

Of the 141 total voters, 94 favored the opt-out, while 47 op-

posed it.

Seventy-five people voted in Frederick (50 yes, 25 no), and 66 people voted in Westport (44 yes, 22 no).

The opt-out will increase the amount levied by the school district by \$200,000.

The school board saw the

opt-out as necessary due to a new S.D. law that reduced the amount of money coming in to the district's capital outlay fund. This had an effect on the general fund as well because the district had regularly transferred funds from the capital outlay fund to the general fund.

New fire hall is part of local progress

Over the history of our fire department, the equipment used to fight fires has been housed within buildings. These buildings have been updated periodically for the size of the equipment since 1884.

Firefighters started out with just buckets between 1882 & 1884, and we still have some of these stored in our current station.

A Hook & Ladder Co. was formed in 1884, and a more formal fire department was formed in

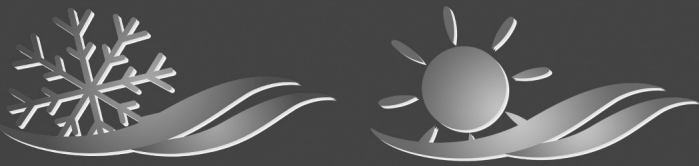
The new fire hall has enough space inside for firefighters to do some of their training indoors instead of having to train outdoors when it's cold out.

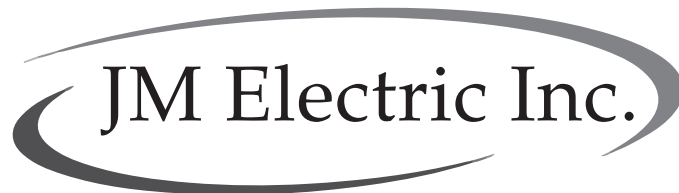
His talents carried over to the baseball diamond as he spent four

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Fire hall: Volunteer work helps to keep costs down

1912. Equipment was housed in the town hall on the same location as the community center. In 1972 the hall was removed, and the current community center, with room to house the ambulance and fire trucks, was built in 1974 at the cost of \$36,000.

Sixty-two years passed between the first hand-pulled equipment and the building of the community center in 1974 to house what was then considered to be much more modern equipment. It's now been 47 years since that building went up, and today, there is more and larger equipment than what was used then.

With each new fire chief, new ideas were implemented. In the '70s to the '90s, newer equipment was added, and the older models were used less. This is no different during our current times and into the future.

Through the fire district formed in 2015, Frederick Area Fire & Rescue serves the northwest corner of Brown County—nine townships, three communities, two lakes and a host of industrial infrastructures.

The community itself has grown not so much in population, but the skyline has changed just this past year. This is progress for our community and guests.

This mission of the district is to provide fire protection and emergency medical and rescue services to the residents, property owners and guest within the district.

When we set out to fund the new fire station, the city and our district were on board as long as the taxes weren't being raised. We found a company, Summitt Construction of Platte, S.D., that proposed a building at a reasonable price after going through several different proposals. They had a final finish date of September 1.

Ground was broken on May 6 by Mardian Construction of Forbes, dirt fill was provided by Don Nickelson of Frederick, and gravel was provided by Dennis Durheim of Ellendale. Interior plumbing was provided by Paul's Plumbing, and Dahme Construction of Aberdeen provided underground plumbing.

For the interior portion of the project, Mertz Lumber Company of Ellendale provided materials, and volunteer firefighters have donated time toward the project in order to meet the September deadline with approximately 1,500 man hours attributed to building the interior rooms.

This helped to keep the costs down, and taxes were not raised for the entire project. A construction loan was secured through the First National Bank of Frederick for the Frederick Area Volunteer Firefighters (501C3 entity).

These articles from the Frederick history book published in honor of its centennial in 1982 show some of the history of firefighting in Frederick.

Firemen Organize in Frederick

Fires plagued the early days of Frederick. From 1882 to 1884 the fires were fought by means of a "bucket brigade". Many of the smaller fires were put out in this way but many also resulted in total losses. In December 1884, a Hook and Ladder Company was organized and Thomas Fylpaa was elected chief.

On November 15, 1894, fire destroyed 14 business places in town. The flames quickly spread from one building to another. On May 28, 1896, the first Roller Flour Mill burned to the ground. The double store building of Rosebrock and Drum burned in February of 1902. Three buildings burned in February of 1905: J. H. Herret's Furniture, J. J. Chamberlain's Hardware, and Murphy's Saloon. In May 1934, the large barn of Isaac Peldo burned. Fire destroyed the I.O.O.F. Hall in February 1936 with all contents a total loss. Another of the major fires of Frederick was the burning of the Empire Elevator in 1943.

The fire is brought out talk of organizing a fire company, but no definite action was taken until January of 1912. A livery barn fire aroused the people and a feasible plan was suggested by F. W. Wenger. L. O. Dickey and Wenger were appointed to head the firemen and the following men were elected to the company: Glenn Jeffers, Paul Gorder, W. E. Howell, M. A. Marttila, A. G. Porter, F. W. Callaghan, August Hoffman, and William Sebring. Ladders and other necessary materials were obtained.

The hand-pulled two-wheel cart with the hose on it was housed in the town hall (at the site of the Community Center). The fire and curfew bell was also located in that building (Walt Morgans remembers being paid five cents a night during the curfew bell.)

Motorization came to the department in 1940 when Glenn Jeffers convert converted a Ford gravel truck into a fire truck. An old army truck, a six by six Rio, was purchased in 1948 with the aid of six adjoining townships at a cost of \$4,000. It was kept in town but was on call at all times for rural fires. At that time the fire chief was Woodrow Emery and his assistant was Preston Picht. In 1958 an International truck was purchased for standby use in the city. About 1976 the yellow truck belonging to the state Department of Forestry was added to the department. It holds a thousand gallons of water and is to be used chiefly for fighting grass fires.

The latest addition to the fire department was made in 1981. The firefighting equipment is mounted on a Ford chassis. It was purchased by the city and neighboring townships with \$1,500 from Brown County. The cost was \$48,860.

The city and rural firemen are merging into one organization with officers to be elected. At the present time Dennis Kinslow and Richard Bakeberg are serving as fire chiefs.

Big Frederick Fire

Source — Frederick Free Press, November 15, 1894

Frederick is visited by flames and half the business portion is a mass of ashes.

Fire was discovered at the rear of the Fylpaa Brothers General Store Saturday afternoon about 5 o'clock and an alarm given at once — the whole interior of the back room was on fire and the smoke so dense that entrance to that part of the building was impossible. Efforts to extinguish the build the fire were to no avail. It was seen at once that most of the block of buildings would burn, so removal of contents was undertaken, but the fire burns so rapidly that only a portion of the goods could be removed from each place. Spreading eastward the fire soon started on the building occupied by E. G. Pettingill as a drug store and dwelling.

The next in the path of the flames was Mrs C. A. Cook's building housing a general store and household goods of George T. Doty. D. Newell's building in which E. C. Dennis and family lived and in which Hoffman Dennis had their grocery was next to fall victim to the fire. The post office building belonging to Mesdames Simmons and Doty was next in line and at this point a ray of hope was entertained as between that building and the Heckelsmiller dwelling and millinery store was a space of 20 feet. Cooler heads saw a chance to check the fire at this point — carpets were thrown onto the roof and by an effort that took nerve and a bit of luck — were kept constantly wet — the heat was so intense that the men had to throw water on each other to keep from burning. (Note the fire went east as far as the Runge building.) At the same time, however, it burned west and all possible means were used to save the City Hotel but, because of the size of the building, the men were powerless to overcome the terrible heat — the hotel was doomed. Next to the hotel stood a row of one- and two-story buildings — nothing could be done in the fire took the Hart and Tweed buildings, Reed building, C. Coykendall's building housing J. E. Jeffers' carpenter shop and stock of flour, the Halpin building and the Utendorfer building occupied by Burnham and Scott's harness shop. There was a space before the H. Barnard building and after a struggle the fire was stopped there on the north side of the street. By this time, though, the fire had crossed to the south side of the street and in a short time had leveled the bank building, meat market and D. Coykendall's. The efficient work of landlord Shonio and others saved the Superior Hotel. Wetting down roofs saved the other buildings on Main Street. Total loss to the town — \$35,000. As soon as it was determined that the building could not be saved the stock was removed — otherwise the losses would have been greater. Many of the buildings were not insured.

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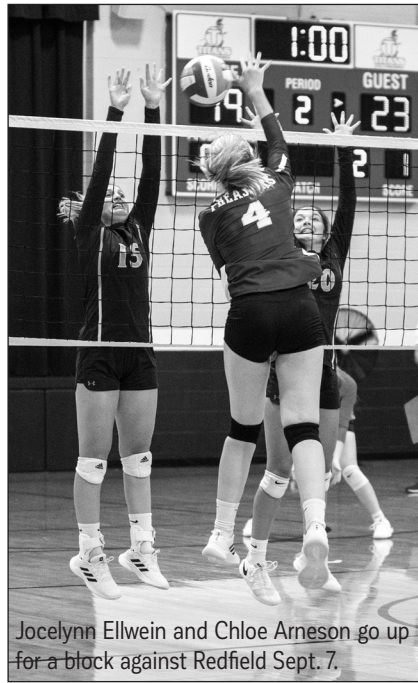

Titans looking for solid season

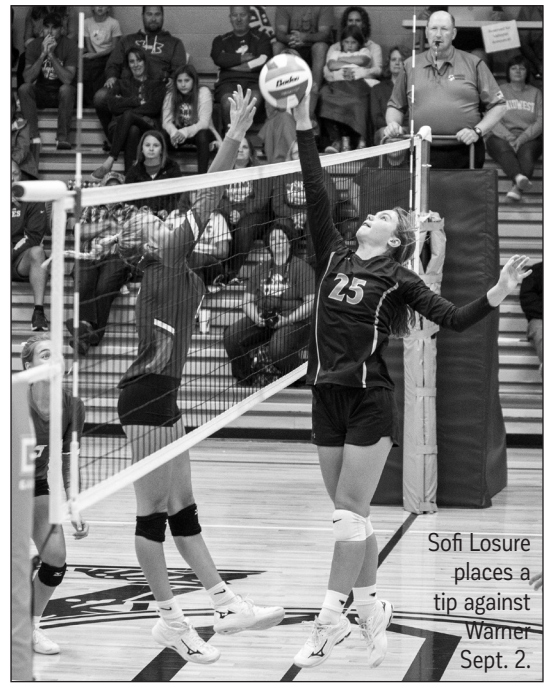
