School board earns award

Members of the Frederick Area School Board earned an award for their dedication to enhancing their knowledge of school board work during the 2020-21 school year.

The Frederick Area School Board earned a Bronze Level award for their participation in the Associated School Boards of South Dakota's board recognition program: ALL, which stands for Act, Learn, Lead and honors the work of school boards who strived to enhance their knowledge base of board work.

By participating in ASBSD activities, training opportunities and demonstrating leadership at the local, state and national level, school boards accumulated points throughout the previous school year. To earn the Bronze Level award, the Frederick Area School Board accumulated 250 or more ALL points.

"We want to congratulate the Frederick Area school board for utilizing the previous school year to broaden their knowledge of

school board work, which will undoubtedly benefit their students, staff and community," ASBSD Executive Director Wade Pogany said.

The Frederick Area School Board received their ALL plaque this fall.

In the fifth year of the program, 77 public school boards, more than half of the public boards in South Dakota, earned an ALL award – the most in the history of the program.

"In a school year unlike any other in terms of challenges local school boards faced, we're thrilled to recognize the time, effort, commitment and leadership put forth by board members," Pogany said.

"A big thank you to all schools board for their work throughout the 2020-21 school year."

ASBSD is a private, non-profit association representing more than 850 South Dakota school board members, the 149 schools they govern and the students they serve.

Teachers work to improve their craft

The job of school principal is often a confusing one for people outside of the school's employ.

If you were to ask most children, my job as principal is largely focused on student discipline and being a "watch-dog" of the building. Many parents may feel the same, as their impressions of what the school principal does are formed from their encounters with this person during their school days. I am thankful, that although student discipline is a part of my job, it is a small part of what I do here every day. We have great kids here that makes this part of the position an easier one!

A larger part of being a principal that is often overlooked is my role in teacher development. Although the public doesn't always get a look into this, so I would like to take a brief moment of your time to share with you what we are doing in this area at FASD this year.

Last year during our Comprehensive Needs Assessment, it was determined by a team of teachers and myself that one of the areas of weakness we had at the school was the implementation of research-based educational strategies.

Now I can tell you, as the per-

son that completes teacher observations, that we have a well-trained staff that understands the "how to" of teaching. Although this appeared to be a weakness, it was simply because numerically it fell lower than other areas with a higher number of parents/teachers/students placing this area as an "agree with" statement opposed to a "strongly agree" statement.

Regardless of the rankings, in my opinion, giving teachers the tools to improve their craft is one of the best things an administrator can do to foster success across the building. So this year, our staff is completing a book study on researched-based strategies called *Classroom Instruction that Works* based on the original work by Robert Marzano, an expert on this subject. This book was recommended to the team by our state-provided mentors during our workshops and delivers nine instructional strategies along with tools and examples to improve teacher effectiveness.

During our professional development time, teachers are discussing the readings, reflecting on their own practices, and coming up with ways to incorporate strategies they have read about. Just as we want students to think about their own learning and what they need to do to be successful, teachers need to be given the same opportunities to think about their own teaching styles and what they can do to make their classrooms places of student learning and success. As I said before, we have a staff that is well-versed in many of these areas already, but it has been interesting to hear their take-aways from the reading and what small changes they are planning to make in their classrooms in order to make an even larger impact.

Teacher development will continue to be a key to our school's success for years to come. Without a highly qualified and passionate staff, we would not see the student success that we do here! Coming up with ways to make teachers stronger is a valuable and rewarding piece of my job. It takes time to do these things, so I am thankful for our professional development days so that we can take the time to prepare, plan, reflect, and provide feedback on all areas of our classrooms in order to provide the best learning experience possible for our students.

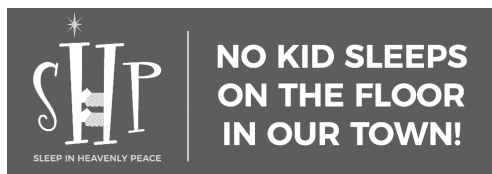

Titans avenge some early-season defeats

The Titans finished with loss to Warner on Nov. 2 and an 8-23 record, but that doesn't paint a full picture of the team this fall. The team showed improvement over the season, as proven by their win over Waubay/Summit Nov. 1.

"The best team highlight was definitely beating Waubay/Summit in straight sets in the first round of Regions, after losing to them in straight sets way back in August," said Coach Holly Mueller. "That was one of our best games, and it came at the right time and showed how much we'd improved as the season progressed."

The Titans were also able to defeat Sully Buttes when they faced them a second time after losing to them early in the season.

Other highlights included winning the consolation championship at the YTC Tournament in August, and winning twice over North Central.

"Beating North Central in back-to-back games in October was definitely a highlight, especially since the first match was a close, tough one, and we played so much better in the second match, winning in straight sets," Mueller said.

"A few individual highlights include Chloe Arneson's 17 straight serves in that second North Central match and Alyx Hoffman's 18 kills against Sunshine Bible (a team season high). Jocelynn Ellwein was also selected to two all-tournament teams, first at the Wolsey/Wessington tournament in September, and

then again at the Wildcat Invitational in October."

Mueller listed serving, team chemistry, work ethic, and versatility as strengths this season.

"These players were always working to improve their serving percentage while still being aggressive at the service line," Mueller said. "We also had great chemistry this year, and that showed on the court during some of the tough games."

"This group showed how hard they are willing to work, going back to spring volleyball last May, through great attendance at the summer weightlifting sessions, and including multiple athletes participating in a second varsity sport. They are not afraid to compete or work hard, and they have the dedication it takes to improve. Many of our players were capable of doing many different things on the court, which helps me as a coach change strategies to best attack an opponent's weakness. It also gives us the ability to plug holes in the lineup, such as when several athletes qualified for state cross country and we had to move players around to different positions against Sunshine Bible."

Passing is one key area of focus before next year.

"We still have room for improvement in that area," Mueller said. "Other areas of focus for next year would be covering the campfire spot and tip line better on defense and serve/receive, while we should look at running different hitting routes as well."

What started out as a promising season for Leola-Frederick with victories over Warner and Langford changed quickly to give the Titans several doses of adversity.

Three straight losses were handed out by Florence-Henry, Faulkton, and Hamlin. It wasn't necessarily the losses themselves but how these losses occurred: Injuries and COVID kept the roster hamstrung throughout this string of games.

"We had a real promising start to the season with our home-opening win against Warner," according to Head Coach Jeff Kosters. "It was a game that we felt we dominated up front. We lost Jericho King (to a hand injury) in that contest, and that was a sign of things to come. In my 25+ years of coaching, I have never had a season like the one we just had as far as injuries go. The amount of time missed due to injury would be more easily measured in seasons rather than games. When healthy, we showed that we could compete with anyone on our schedule, but that just wasn't the case for us in most of our games this year."

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some healthy competition for starting spots up front next year.

"Offensively, we return our entire backfield next year. Our younger kids found out in a hurry the difference between junior
