

A good night of sleep is good test preparation

State testing season is quickly approaching for students across the state.

This year, students at the Frederick Area School will test between March 20-April 20. All students in grades 3 through 8 and 11 will take the South Dakota English Language Arts and Mathematics assessments. Grades 5, 8, and 11 will also take an assessment in Science. We estimate the English assessment will take 3.5 hours and the math assessment will take 2.5 hours. The science assessments also take an estimated two hours. This time will be spread out into smaller chunks over a few weeks. Below you will see the exact dates/times of testing for your child.

Tests are taken on the computer and are untimed.

These tests are an important part of our school improvement process and assist teachers in understanding strengths and weaknesses in students and curriculum in order to design



stronger instruction.

There is no need to study in preparation for the assessments. We do, however, ask that you encourage your children to do their best and get plenty of rest the night before the assessment. It is important that you make sure your child comes to school on days that he/she has tests. Making up a missed test means time out of class and losing important learning time that cannot be made up.

Reports showing scores will be sent home with final report cards at the end of the year.

We appreciate your support and encouragement during testing season. It is truly one of the best things you can do to ensure success!



It was a season of improvement for the boys basketball squad this winter. After starting out 0-5, the boys stuck together and kept getting better in practice and went 8-7 the last month and a half.

"The season really could have gone two ways after the start we had," said Coach Brock Pashen. "The boys stuck together and stayed the course and had a pretty solid season. What started as a season of promise quickly faded into the winter night as the girls basketball team was devastated by injuries the second half of the season.

The Titans finished the regular season 9-11 with a 2-5 clip in LRC play.

The girls started of the 2022 portion of the schedule by reeling off four straight wins.

"We definitely made improvements from the previous year," said Coach Jeff Kosters. "We scored a couple more points per game and defensively allowed eight points fewer per game. We had nearly 100 more rebounds than our opponents and had more assists than our opponents.

"The biggest area we need to focus on moving forward is turnovers. We had 51 more turnovers this season as compared to last season, and 105 more than our opponent this past season. We did shoot the ball better from both inside the arc and behind it."

After that four-game winning streak, injuries to Alyx Hoffman, Jocelynn Ellwein, and Olivia Morlock required other players to step into bigger roles.

"While we made some strides this past season, we certainly aren't content with where we are," Kosters said. "We were a young team without any seniors on the floor, and the injury bug hurt us the last half of the season. Younger girls who weren't expected to play varsity were thrown into the fire. Hopefully that experience will pay off moving forward.

"There will be competition for playing time next year, and I think that will only help our cause. Looking forward to summer plans, we are looking at the Britton summer league, team camps at Dakota State and Fergus Falls. A few girls participate in the Sacred Hoops program, as well the majority of the girls attending Coach Pashen's summer clinics."
